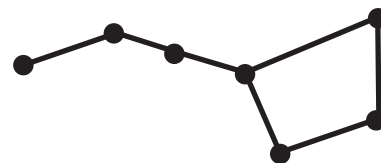
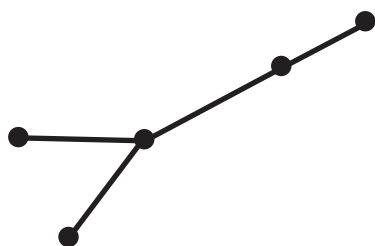
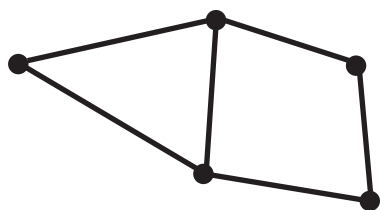
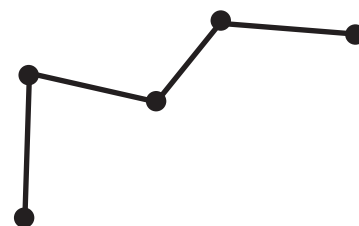
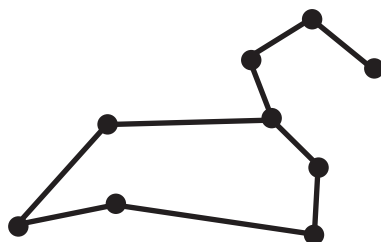
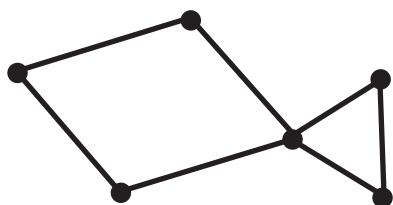


The Star Outside My Window

Cepheus: Husband to Cassiopeia and a king in Ancient Greek mythology. Often depicted as holding his arms high to beg for mercy for his daughter.

Leo: The lion, complete with its long tail.

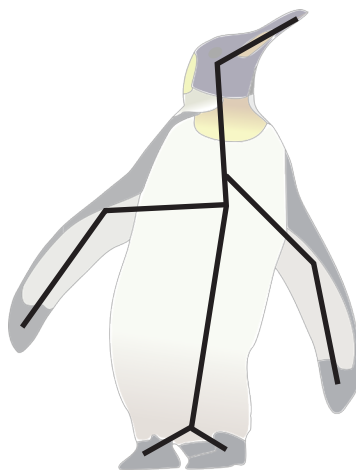
Lyra: Also known as the 'lyre' or the 'harp', this constellation is said to look like the musical instrument.
